Key Principles in Elections

- Two key principles held in tension



- Promote participation...but not at the expense of security/integrity
- Ultimate objective is a result that will be trusted as accurate
- Background is always secrecy of the vote – so an individual can vote without threats, intimidation etc

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A Safe Election?

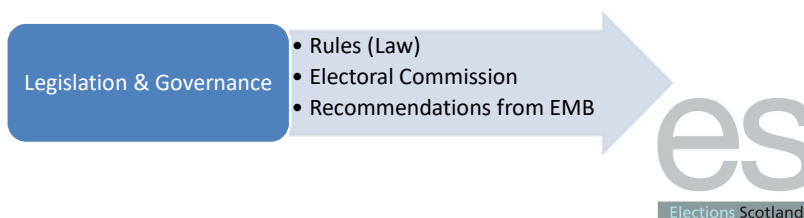
- **Secrecy of the ballot**
- **Every paper accounted for**
- **Voting free from influence / treating etc**
- **Safety = free from the virus and minimising any risk of infection!**
- **Major public events**
- **Large gatherings**

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An Election: 2 “Who”s and 2 “How”s

Who can vote?	Who do they vote for?	How do they vote?	How did they vote?

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- Integrity challenges at each stage
 - False registration?
 - Personation?
 - False nominations?
 - Undue influence at polling?
 - Postal voting fraud?
 - Counting irregularities?

Accessibility	Integrity
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Everyone entitled to vote should be able to vote.... BUT 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ONLY those entitled to vote only ONCE without pressure or threat only THEIR votes counted and each vote counts equally

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- Also now infection control at each
 - Physical distancing
 - Enhanced hygiene
 - Growth in postal votes
 - Controlled polling
 - Count events

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A Covid Election

- Overall Reliance on **Physical Distancing and Hand Hygiene**
- Likely increase in postal votes
 - Integrity issues
- Controlled Polling
 - Ceiling on voters per station
 - Range of measures: distancing, one way, ventilation, signage, pencils, screens, hygiene etc
- Count
 - Friday & Saturday NOT overnight and will take longer.
 - Security of boxes overnight
 - Controlled access

Coronavirus Factors

- 8 by-elections in October and November
 - Valuable lessons
 - 11 more in March
- Supplementary Guidance for nominations, polling and count
 - Electoral Commission Guidance
- Risk Management high priority

Scottish Parliament Election 2021 – Key Facts

- Legislation – new legislation (Coronavirus)
- 73 constituencies – 1 MSP each
- 8 Regions – 7 MSPs each
 - Two ballot papers for each voter (Lilac and Peach)
- 32 Constituency Returning Officers / 8 Regional Returning Officers - Chief Executives of the local Council
 - Responsible for nominations (who to vote for), polling, postal votes (how to vote), counting the votes (who did they vote for)
 - National coordination from EMB
- 15 EROs who are responsible for the Electoral Register (the “Who can Vote”)
- Includes 16/17 year olds and all legal residents (new franchise)
- 31 different count locations
 - Aberdeen and Aberdeenshire share P&J Live

Nomination period	16 March – 31 March
Notice of Poll	31 March
First Issue of postal votes	14 – 16 April
Polling Day	6 May
Verification and Count	7 and 8 May.....

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The Campaign

- Spending Limits
 - Level playing field
- Campaign Material
 - Imprints
- Posters on lamp posts
 - Check rules with Local RO
- Entitled to copies of the register of electors for electoral purposes (only)
- Freepost delivery of election material (refer to Royal Mail)
- Use of rooms for the purpose of public meetings
- Do's and Don'ts
 - Encourage & Help (only!)
 - **Code of Conduct for handling postals**



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Polling

- 7am – 10pm
- List of polling places (buildings) from RO
 - **Changes due to use as vaccination centres or testing**
- Each *station* will have 2 boxes - **Constituency** and **Region**
- Secrecy of the ballot is a fundamental principle of our democracy!
 - Background to “no selfies”
- Behaviour of “tellers” - **DISCOURAGED UNDER COVID CONDITIONS**
- **Covid Direction – limiting numbers to reduce queues and congestion**
- **MASKS, VENTILATION, ONE WAY, HAND SANITISER etc**
- **Pencil**



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Postal Voting



- Very important element of the election
 - 15-20% of electoral roll; 25-50% of counted votes
 - **Likely to grow.....40% due to Covid**
- Confidence in the system depends on integrity of campaigners
- Must be seen to be fair, no question of interference
- Date of Birth and Signature
- Issued around 15 April
- Returned and kept secure until opening sessions
- Opening Sessions – open to observers
 - Requirement for secrecy and experience of 2014
- Some integrity issues - investigated

Counting.....before Covid!



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The Count - Process

- **Friday 6 May and Saturday 8 May**
 - Boxes need security overnight
- **Verification** – does the number of papers in the box match the number issued at polling stations?
 - Including unused and spoilt
 - Report made available to observers
- **Count** – how many for each candidate
 - Total for each, plus rejects should = verification figure
- **Constituency** and **Region** generally counted simultaneously
- Constituency declarations by CRO, Regional declarations by RRO



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The Count – Behaviour etc

- Behaviour in Count Hall
 - Requirement for secrecy
 - Instructions from RO to be obeyed
 - Escalation protocol with respect to Public Order
 - **Physical Distancing**
- Agents have an important role in scrutiny
 - Represent the elector in the hall
 - Verify that things are being done correctly...
 - **HOW DO WE DO THIS UNDER CORONAVIRUS?**



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Integrity concerns from Returning Officers

- From recent experience....
- Postal Voting
 - Process
 - Observers
- Polling
 - Process
 - Personation
- Transport of boxes to count
- Count itself



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Integrity Lessons from recent elections

- Objective remains: **trust in the process, the people and the result**
- Increased political engagement and increased scrutiny from the public and campaigns
 - Must do the right thing and be seen to do the right thing
- Ignorance Gaps gave opportunity for conspiracy theories
 - Work to educate and inform voters
 - Explain checks and balances
 - Your vote is secure.



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Integrity issues continued

- Personation – some confusion in approach
 - Protocol
 - Deliver count but preserve evidence
 - Material provided to Police only with Court Order
- Social Media conspiracies
- Threats to candidates
- Overall well run and no concerns with respect to integrity



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Impact of Coronavirus

Adding complexity to every stage of the process



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
